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Introduction

The Centre for North East Studies and Policy Research (C-NES) was established in January 2000 as a Trust under Sec.80G/ Income Tax Act 1961. It has offices in Guwahati, Assam state in North eastern India and at New Delhi and works on a range of issues and areas at both field and policy levels relating to governance, participative planning and rights, water resources, environment, rural livelihoods, peace building and building better understanding among communities. C-NES is committed to building bridges between the North-east, among the lesser known and misunderstood parts of India, and other regions. The region is finally and slowly creating its own space and finding its own pulse after over six decades. C-NES develops innovative ideas for implementation to reach the poor and marginalized group in areas of health, education and environment, conducts workshops and training programs, reviews government policies and projects and designs ideas for development.

From The Managing Trustee



The Boat Clinic programmes of C-NES and the organization itself continues to forge ahead with new partnerships and opportunities. The new collaborations have been enriching. A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for collaboration was signed on 8th July, 2016 between Manipal University, Karnataka one of the top educational institutions of the country and C-NES. Dr Narayana Sabhahit, Registrar, Manipal University and I were the signatories of the MOU. This will enable us to hopefully move into capacity building as well as teaching modules in the health sector in Assam and the NE. The partnership with the Hyderabad based SaciWATERs, for a research project titled, 'Building Capacity of Civil-Society Organisations and Communities for Effective Engagement in Transboundary Decision-Making Process of Brahmaputra River' aims to build capacity of civil society organizations and their representative communities. This

is specifically aimed at women for effective engagement in transboundary decision-making process of Brahmaputra River. C-NES' partnership with the Belgium based Constellation, on a 1 year project on Impact assessment of SALT approach to increase immunizations coverage through community engagement, has been taken up in 30 villages of Bongaigaon district from February 2017. The project, being supported by International Initiative for Impact Evaluation (3IE) and funded by BMGF will be evaluated by PHFI & IIPH.

Our Brahmaputra Radio Station continues with excellent work. On 10th July, 2016, the radio station completed one year of formal broadcasting. Over the years, it has been a joy to see its growth. Staffed by a young and dedicated team and led by the committed and creative Bhaskar Bhuyan, BCRS has moved from first tentative steps to regular programming in Assamese, Mishing, Shadri and Bhojpuri. Over 10 hours of programming every day, BCRS has an audience on islands and tea plantation communities in a geographical spread that covers three districts and hundreds of villages.

A book titled 'Women and Reproductive Health' based on a family planning intervention conducted by C-NES which graphically maps the health choices and challenges before women in the isolated island communities on the Brahmaputra River in Assam was released early this year. It was authored by Chandana Bora, the then state advocacy and family planning coordinator, C-NES-PFI project and Dr. CR Hira, Technical Consultant, C-NES released by Dr. Poonam Muttreja, Executive Director, PFI,

Assam's Maternal Mortality ratio, though improved over 10 years, remains India's worst at 300 per 100,000 deliveries. The state is the worst performer, says the Sample Registration System (SRS), 2013 reports published by Registrar General of India, also in the Infant Mortality Ratio. We have a long way to go. There can be no relaxation in the commitment to improving access to healthcare to vulnerable groups, especially women and children in our Boat Clinic 13 districts (two districts, Barpeta and Dhubri, given the size of their population have two units each). There are more than 200 staff members, including 30 doctors, 45 nurses and 30 lab technicians and pharmacists, many of whom live on the boats when it is on mission to reach the needy through the camps.

Our work has been effective. Of that, there is no doubt. But it is also extremely arduous for the Boat

Clinics health teams and others who work in the field. Most boats need at least a basic three to four feet (one to 1.3 meters) depth of water level in the dry season to be fully mobile and consequently to reach communities. These past years, climate change have adversely affected the glaciers of Tibet, impacting water flows downstream which have also been hit by erratic monsoon rains. This is of critical importance to the work of C-NES with the Boat Clinics. The NHM of the Government of Assam has been a solid and dependable partner in our efforts to reach the most vulnerable through teams of medical and non-medical personnel. Though much needs to be done, as I have stressed, it is deeply encouraging to see the drop in maternal mortality rates and improvement in infant mortality conditions.Till 31st March 2017, over 2.12 million (21 lakh) numbers of basic health services have been provided over the past 10 years of work. Every year, we handle not less than 400,000 cases of patients needing care and succor.

As in the previous years this year too our work, through the Boat Clinics have been covered extensively in the local and international media. We have had visitors like Sir Mark Tully, the legendary BBC correspondent and former Bureau Chief of BBC, New Delhi, India along with renowned writer Gillian Wright and Dr.Henk Bekedam, the World Health Organization (WHO) Representative to India visiting the Clinics. And the good word spreads. Reading about the Boat Clinics in an online magazine, philanthropist, Almitra Patel, based at Bengaluru, a member of the Supreme Court committee for Solid waste management has donated solar lamps to light up remote villages in the Brahmaputra river islands in Assam, appreciating the innovative health outreach work in the Brahmaputra islands. The Bengaluru based SELCO Foundation has proposed to take up Jorhat Boat Clinic as a pilot project for installation of solar power to cater to the entire need of the boat and the health service delivery 24x7 including power to run the dental unit on board. The system will also include a 50 ltrs solar Surechill refrigerator to store vaccines.

I wish to express my deep gratitude to each member of my team in C-NES led by Ashok Rao and the PMU as well as the programme staff at the district level, the research units, the office staff. Our accounting unit regularly trains our staff in financial procedures.

I particularly wished to thank the Department of Health, Government of Assam, The Minister of Health Dr. Himata Biswa Sarma, State Chief Secretary VK Pipersenia, Mr Sameer Singha, Principal Secretary (Health), Dr. J.V.N Subramanyam NHM's Mission Director and colleagues in Assam, who have been a source of strength and support.

Our Auditors, Jagdish Chand & Co ensured the accounts are in order. The Board of Trustees under the chair of Dr. V A Pai Panandiker, Chairman have been not just supportive but actively involved in several of our projects. Their unstinting support and that of the Advisory Council members have helped us walk steadily through difficult patches. We have regular trust meetings where key decisions are taken. The last meeting was held in Delhi on 21st February 2017 attended by Trustees Dr. Panandiker, Dr. Jayanta Madhab, G.K.Pillai, Patricia Mukhim and Preeti Gill along with Programme Manager Ashok Rao and I.

We hope our work will continue to expand in other areas of the North East, beyond the Boat Clinics and the BCRS which remain both show pieces and flagship of C-NES. We ask for your support and good wishes



Health Initiative: Boat Clinics with NHM


Since 2005, C-NES has been providing basic health care services to the flood vulnerable population living in the Brahmaputra islands, through specially developed boats equipped with OPD, laboratories on board as well as pharmacies, first to one, then three and now reach thirteen districts in Assam through a Public Private Partnership (PPP) with the National Health Mission (NHM), Government of Assam. The goal is to take sustained health care to lakhs of persons on the islands, for the first time since independence, with a special focus on women and children, who are the most vulnerable in difficult conditions. Assam has India's worst Maternal Mortality Rate at 328 MMR (Registrar General of India, Special Bulletin on Maternal Mortality in India 2010-12) higher than Bihar or Uttar Pradesh and a high Infant Mortality Rate at 54 IMR.


Providing ANC, PNC checkups along with advocating institutional deliveries has been priority with all the Boat Clinic health teams especially crucial for a state like Assam. The organization started with one boat and seven staff in Dibrugarh district in 2005, with support from district health and administration. The success in the intervention drew the attention of UNICEF and what was then NRHM, Govt. of Assam, resulting in the spread of the Boat Clinic programme to thirteen districts- Dibrugarh, Tinsukia, Dhemaji, Jorhat, Lakhimpur, Sonitpur, Morigaon, Kamrup, Nalbari, Dhubri (2 units), Barpeta (2 Units), Bongaigaon and Goalpara.


Each district has 15 staff headed by the District Programme Officer (DPO) who is the key person in organizing district plans and coordinating among the team, district health departments, district administration, NHM and the community. His or her team includes two Medical Officers and paramedical staff including two ANMs, a GNM, a pharmacist and one laboratory technician besides three community workers and a four member boat crew. The work of the boat clinics has led to remarkable results: On an average, 18,000-20,000 people are treated every month in the districts, individuals who were earlier beyond the reach of government programmes because no doctors or paramedics would go on a regular basis. The only time, villagers say, they would see a doctor on site was during an emergency like a major flood. Otherwise, they had to travel long distances at great cost and risk to get treated. Today, the services come virtually to their doorstep. Till April 2016, over 1.88 million people have been given basic health services.






















Solar Lights for Island Villages

Thanks to a philanthropist, remote villages in the Brahmaputra river islands in Assam will soon be lit up with solar street lights. The donor, Almitra Patel, based at Bengaluru is a member of the Supreme Court committee for Solid Waste Management for Class 1 cities, Technical Expert, Swachh Bharat Mission, Government of India, Clean Jharkhand Project and Ganga ICDP Kanpur. She felt the need of the communities inhabiting the islands while reading an article on the Boat Clinics written by Devjyot Ghosal in the Quartz India online magazine and appreciated C-NES' innovative health outreach work in the Brahmaputra islands. 339 Solar Street Lights (SSLs) are being donated in three batches. The first batch was for four mid Assam districts (Sonitpur, Morigaon,Nalbari,Kamrup) where 111 SSLs were installed. The second batch was for 5 upper Assam districts (Tinsukia, Dibrugarh,Dhemaji, Lakhimpur and Jorhat) where 92 SSLs were installed.

On Call. At Midnight

11th June 2016: After a long, strenuous trip to remote Tinsukia districts Amarpur sapori, the boat clinic Tinsukia unit stopped for a night halt at Mohmora. It was 11 pm, a tired team was retiring for the night. Suddenly voices were heard near the river bank. I went outside and saw a group of people trying to tell us something with a sense of urgency. An elderly woman came to me and informed that her daughter had delivered a baby at home a few hours ago. There were complications. I quickly informed the Medical Officer Dr. Ankur about the patient. Immediately preparing the essentials and medicines we proceeded to her place. K.Tanti (GNM), Tara (ANM), Chandra (ANM), Murari yadav (Boat driver) and Durga Prasad (boat helper) accompanied us. Access was difficult, we had to cross a river on a small boat and then walk for almost 30 minutes wading through knee high water and slush as the village was really hard hit by recent floods. It was past midnight. After reaching the house we got to know that this was an unregistered case. Later the ASHA informed us that the family did not let the woman come for antenatal checkups inspite of regular visits by her. The M.O and GNM were able to successfully handle the case in the most challenging conditions By the time we were ready to come back to the boat it was 3.15 am. But we were happy that the condition of the mother and child were stable and the mother had started nursing the baby. The M.O asked the family members to take the mother and the infant to the nearest hospital at the earliest. Bhargav Baruah

Workshops/ Events

C-NES-CHRI Workshop

In collaboration with C-NES, the Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative (CHRI) organized an interaction with senior representatives of print and electronic media from across the region on Right to Information Act (RTI) in Guwahati on 5th December 2016. The effort was to bring media persons into the RTI framework and to examine the impact and the nature of the challenges before the use of the Act, especially in the North-east. CHRI is committed to developing RTI as a tool by the media, use it to enable greater professionalism among journalists and help to press overall for greater transparency and governance. The media representatives agreed to promote awareness and the strategic use of RTI in the Northeastern states together with CHRI.

The welcome, introduction and overview of the objectives of the workshop were delivered by Sanjoy Hazarika, Director, CHRI while the keynote was given by H S Das, Assam Chief Information Commissioner. One of the pioneers of RTI, Venkatesh Nayak of CHRI made a presentation on RTI and how it become a tool for better, more professional media work. Senior journalist Samudra Gupta Kashyap, spoke on "Using RTI: a journalist's story" followed by open discussion focusing on challenges before journalists, RTI experiences from the field and how journalists are using RTI. There were over 40 participants at the interactive work shop including journalists from both the print and electronic media from the region

The aim of this project is to build capacity of civil society organizations and their representative communities, specifically women for effective engagement in transboundary decision-making process of Brahmaputra River. It aims to create a platform to discuss the issues, challenges, and opportunities towards improved co-management of the river basin. The project started as a bilateral dialogue between India and Bangladesh and eventually evolved into a multilateral dialogue forum with the inclusion of Bhutan and China.

C-NES and Constellation

Constellation, a registered not for profit organization with its head office in Belgium through their Indian partner Samraksha have entered into a one year partnership with C-NES from February 2017 to work together on a project titled "Impact assessment of the SALT (Stimulate, Appreciate, Learn and Transfer) approach of community engagement to increase immunizations coverage through ownership – a mixed methods study in Assam". The SALT approach of community engagement initiated by Constellation has been widely appreciated and used by different organizations globally. C-NES had been given the responsibility to conduct the project in 30 villages of Bongaigaon district while Voluntary Health Association of Assam (VHAA) have been given Kamrup (Rural)and Udalguri districts. The Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI) and Indian Institute of Public Health (IIPH) Shillong with support from International Initiative for Impact Evaluation will evaluate and conduct impact assessment for the project and the SALT approach. The partnership's main objective is to improve children's health via increased immunization uptake.

WHO India Representative Visits Boat Clinic

Dr.Henk Bekedam, the World Health Organization (WHO) Representative to India accompanied by a team from WHO India including Dr Debashish Roy, Regional Team Leader, East and officials of Health Department, Govt of Assam, visited a Boat Clinic health camp on 5th October 2016. The camp was held at Bhokuamari Char/island under Chhaygaon Block of Kamrup (Rural) district. Dr Bekedam observed different aspects of health camp and also interacted with the local ASHAs, village headman and others. Brahmaputra Community Radio Station

C-NES' Brahmaputra Community Radio Station, popularly known as Radio Brahmaputra is based at Dibrugarh, very close to where the mighty river flows by at Maijan ghat. The station is unique in the sense that it caters to the needs and aspirations of people belonging to as many as five communities residing around the area in as many local languages – Shadri (dialect of the tea tribe community), Assamese, Bhojpuri, Bodo, and Mishing. While BCRS seeks to reach the most marginalised groups in 14 islands and 30 tea plantations and more than 180 villages in Dibrugarh district, its footprint reaches across the Brahmaputra to other districts as well. Today it broadcasts for eight hours every day on FM 90.4 from Dibrugarh and can be heard in three districts along and across the Brahmaputra.

On 10 July, 2016, the radio station completed one year of formal broadcasting. On this occasion, the BCRS team organized a small event at Radio Brahmaputra, attended by few regular listeners and well-wishers. The team awarded two best volunteers -Swaraswati Sahani and Arup Sonowal for the year of 2015-16 with a certificate and a radio set each

C-NES Interns

Boat Clinics have provided opportunities to students doing research on delivery of primary healthcare and education to the islands on the Brahmaputra. Research studies have been conducted by students from across the globe for the last eight years. While the interns have benefited from the unique work the organization does in the Brahmaputra valley be it in the spheres of health, education, conflicts and communications (through the Brahmaputra Community Radio Station) among others, the organization has also gained from their internship. Their work with the organization and the reports shared with C-NES has given the organization constructive feedback focusing as they do on both the positive impacts of the Boat Clinics and the organizations work as also the gaps which need filling up, valuable suggestions for improving service delivery with a fresh perspective.

Follows an excerpt from a report by intern Anjali Mariam Paul from the Azim Premji Universuity, Bengalaru who did an intensive internsive with C-NES for six weeks during June- July 2016

When Saving Lives Becomes a Daily Adventure

There is something magical about watching a woman breastfeed her newborn for the first time, especially when it is in one of Assam's sand bars, where infant and maternal deaths are just as common as fevers and colds. The Auxiliary Nursing Midwives (ANMs) who have along with the boat clinics, just coincidentally come to this particular sand bar on their routine monthly visit, a day after this baby is born, instruct the mother as to how she should feed her baby, burp her, when and how to bathe her and how to gently hold her, supporting her neck and head at all times. The baby weighs about 3.3 kg and the mother is highly anaemic but a few hours into the delivery, both are looking healthy. Not many women in Assam are as lucky as her, that being said neither are many babies as Assam has the highest Maternal Mortality Rate and Infant Mortality Rate in the country, and has been this way since the late 1900s.

As a student of development, with no background whatsoever in the health sector, the past few weeks with C-NES' boat clinics has been a dumbfounding experience. In preparation for my 6 week internship here, I read as many articles, papers, state reports and basically any piece of literature I could lay my hands, be it fiction or non-fiction about Assam as this was my first trip to the North East and I wanted to be prepared. Little did I know that no amount of literature would even come close to define the destitution that I would witness on these forgotten islands, known as saporis or chars, which would pierce my soul and keep me awake into the wee hours of the morning.

Over the past few weeks, as I traversed along the mighty Brahmaputra, gulping in the fresh air and the exquisite view of Arunachal's hills draping the river on one side while I was in Dibrugarh and the Naga Hills when I was in Jorhat, sleeping under the starlit sky, never would I have dreamt that there would be death, destitution and deprivation lurking close by. Yet, that was the reality that would be unfolded to me in a few hours when Maternal Mortality Rates and Infant Mortality Rates wouldn't be just numbers but suddenly have names, families and now what remained, fond memories. I was privileged to spend 2 nights with the Dibrugarh and 5 nights with the Jorhat team of miracle workers, where I faced a mighty storm, leeches, unbelievably huge spiders, incessant rain and last but not the least, an unfortunate tumble out of a moving truck to actually see first hand what is happening in these islands which are excluded from the mainland, both physically and socially. I silently observed the boat crew as they set up a tent in a few minutes on the mainland, as soon as we docked and how methodically, the team of ANMs, GNM, Medical Officers, Laboratory Technicians, Pharmacist and the community workers set the tables up, with the required equipment, waiting for the patients to start trickling in. In Jorhat, the community worker set up a megaphone on the boat and informed the residents who stay in the interior areas of the islands (due to the fear of erosion) that the doctors have arrived. In addition to this, the ASHAs go around on their cycles, to the tenements in the islands to remind the women who are due for their routine antenatal checkups and to bring their children for their vaccinations and Vitamin A drops. I accompanied a community worker as he went to a makeshift govt. school (the school building got washed away due to the erosion caused by the raging Brahmaputra) to ask the teacher to send children who were suffering from cold, cough, fevers, skin irritations etc. to the health camp happening near the shore.

I remember the torturous, sleepless night which followed reading about Rakku, a fictional character who symbolised the state of poor maternal and infant health care in the rural areas of Tamil Nadu, in the 1970s. I remember the discussion in class and how it all seemed to distant and here I was in the midst of it all, listening to women talk about the death of their children, husbands talking about their wives dying as though it was a normal occurrence. I then remembered the number of people attending these health camps, going back with medicines for their illnesses and the faces of those dedicated and passionate miracle workers... doctors, nurses, laboratory technicians, pharmacists, community workers, ASHAs and the boat crew who knew these patients by name and smiled, knowing that all hope isn't lost... not yet.

Maclina Dutta, an MSW student from Amity University, Noida interned with C-NES' Radio Brahmaputra during June 2016. She writes:

During my internship with Radio Brahmaputra I visited a number of local villages with the reporters of Radio Brahmaputra who gave them lessons about various health issues and community related problems. At Maijaan Village, near the banks of the Brahmaputra, where villagers face problems such as flood, health and sanitation. a quiz competition related to child and mother's health was organized by BCRS. At Ethel wood Tea Estate, a narrow casting program was organized where the women from the tea tribe told us about the health related problems they have been facing this summer such as headache, diahhrea, viral fever etc. We wanted to know from them, what do they know about diarreah but they could not answer us. So we told them the causes of diarrhea as also the necessary steps to prevent it. Many new Government schemes were introduced to them. Radio Brahmaputra helped me in learning about relevant social issues which will inspire me to be a better social worker, even a better human being.

Volunteers from Spain

Clara Gené Škrabec and Mariona Condom Sinyol fresh graduates from Medical School at the University of Barcelona, Spain volunteered with C-NES ' Boat Clinic health teams from the 17th February 2017 to March 3rd 2017 across four river island districts- Kamrup, Morigaon, Jorhat and Dibrugarh. They attended day camps at Kamrup on the 8th of February 2017 with Bhaswati Goswami, Communications Officer and Morigaon on the 9th with Technical Consultant Dr CR Hira after which they spent three days on the Jorhat Boat Clinic. Finally at Dibrugarh, they spent a night on the Boat Clinic Akha and also got to know C-NES' Radio Brahmaputra, the community radio station. They interacted with the health teams and beneficiaries in each district and were amazed to see the variety in culture and beliefs among the river island dwellers. They add "The first thing that we noticed was that the organization of the boat team is optimal regarding the number of members and their responsibilities. All the members know their duties and carry them out as a well-adjusted engine. In addition, the care is perfectly adapted to the communities and their special needs. During this experience we learnt that health care makes much more sense when it is centered on people's needs, rather than just repeating the same standard model. They told us they do not usually do a physical check-up of pregnant women, only when a complication is suspected, because it would not be well received in this conservative community. We learnt that it is actually more important to build trust and reach more people than to follow a thorough protocol. We've had the opportunity to get to know the amazing work the Boat Clinics are carrying out with the isolated communities on the islands of the Brahmaputra River, and we have great affection for the people we've met along the way." Volunteering for a Dental Camp

Dr Kuldeep Singh Shekhawat, Assistant Professor, Srinivas Institute of Dental Sciences, Suratkal, Karnataka, initiated and coordinated with Mahindra Finance Limited to provide funds for two sets of mobile dental unit as additional service to the remote island population through the Boat Clinics. The service was started in March 2016 at Jorhat Boat Clinic and in February 2017 at Bongaigaon Boat Clinic with support from the District Health Society. Dr. Kuldeep visited Assam in March 2017 to volunteer and conducted dental treatment camps on board both Bongaigaon and Jorhat Boat Clinic for the rural and needy river island population, unable to access and/or afford such services. He had earlier conducted similar dental outreach program in May 2014 at Leh, Ladakh. He recalls his unique experience:

Visit to Boat Dental Clinic

As rightly said, "when it comes to global health, there is no 'them' only 'us'".

The concept of providing healthcare services on boat for the habitants of riverine island of Brahmaputra was started by C-NES about a decade ago. I came to know about this project sometime in 2012. Back then a vague idea about an oral health care service provision on boat had occurred to me. It has been a long journey since then. The blue-print of the entire program was sorted out with the cooperation of C-NES, and finally the boat dental clinic program took off in March 2016. In March 2017 I finally had an opportunity to visit and volunteer in 2 boat clinics in Bongaigaon and Jorhat, where the dental unit are installed.

The dental set up is a makeshift arrangement (on purpose) and yet is substantial and functional. It is equipped with a portable dental chair, a portable compressor and light source. The portability of the set up makes it effective in case the villages are away from the shores and demand some shuttling. The setup is adequate for screening patients for dental diseases, preparing cavities (to drill and remove the diseased tooth) and fill them, for scaling (cleaning of teeth) and removing decayed tooth (extraction). The set up is also fortified to manage any medical emergencies arising during dental procedures. "Start where you are. Use what you have. Do what you can", which is the basic operational essence in outreach programs can be clearly witnessed in this set-up.

Any outreach activity also significantly hinges on appropriate and dedicated human resource. Since boat clinic program is based on Private Public Partnership model (PPP), one qualified dentist employed under the banner of National Health Mission is deputed for one week on the boat every month. This flexible pattern ensures that, dental services at other health centers are not compromised. Apart from dentist there is one assistant, one Auxiliary Nurse Midwife (ANM), one GNM, and other members who are usually present on boat. This makes a satisfactory team for basic dental care.

Conditions requiring complex treatment, however, have limited scope of receiving adequate treatment. This is because such conditions require multiple sitting procedures with a certain time interval in between each session. Also, since dentists are deputed for one week very month, the remaining three weeks go without any oral health care being provided.

An effective way to overcome this drawback could be to utilize the services of ANW and GNM. These can be trained by a qualified dentist about the concepts of sterilizing dental instruments, cleaning of teeth, performing preventive restorations, drilling cavities and filling them. Oral health education to maintain their oral hygiene and importance of the same can be done by trained medical staff on the boat.

The biggest strength of boat clinics is the sheer determination and a zealous passion of the entire team (right from helper, cook, cleaner to medical team) to work for humanity. Grounded to reality, the innovativeness, motivation, training, learning and most importantly partnering with other agencies but not being dependent

on them makes this project the best and the first of its kind in India and abroad. I have drawn a tremendous inspiration from this team.

Reaching out to those who are justly in need dental services is rather satisfying. The population being aided is one which has no access to any oral health services commutable by road, since this population resides on riverine islands formed due to ferocious coursing of Brahmaputra. C-NES had been doing a phenomenal job in providing general health services on boat, but in case any discomfort caused due to dental pain, these habitants had to either travel across Brahmaputra using a boat or suffer in silence. A dental clinic alongside general health clinics on boat has brought relief and reassurance to many. It has also opened opportunities for preventive and educative undertakings that would dramatically improve the oral health status of these inlands.

Having planned a program from scratch and gradually giving a shape and finally seeing it being implemented after a long wait of more than 2 years gives me immense satisfaction. I feel as if I could contribute for the welfare of our nation with whatever little knowledge I have. I am also grateful for having this opportunity where in I could mediate in a small way, a healthy smile to islanders, amidst their harsh lives.



Significant Accounting Policies :

1) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements -

The Financial Statements comprising the Balance sheet and the Income and Expenditure account are prepared under the historical cost convention, on the Accrual Basis of accounting. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the statements are consistent with those followed in the previous year.

2) Donation / Grant -

Donation received is recognized as income when the donation is received, except where the terms and conditions require the donations to be utilized over a certain period. Such Donations are recorded under Income side in the Income and Expenditure Account.

Grants received with specific programs/activities are recognized as income when it is received and are recorded under Income side in the Income and Expenditure Account.

3) Fixed Assets -

Fixed assets are recorded at cost of acquisition including incidental costs related to acquisition and installation.

4) Depreciation -

Depreciation is charged on fixed assets on Written Down Value basis at the rates specified by the Income Tax Act, 1961.
